Brenda J. Child is Northrop Professor and former Chair of the Departments of American Studies and American Indian Studies at the University of Minnesota, where she received the President's Engaged Scholar Award in 2021. She was recently named a Guggenheim Fellow. She is the author of several books in American Indian history including *Boarding School Seasons: American Indian Families, 1900-1940* (1998), which won the North American Indian Prose Award; *Holding Our World Together: Ojibwe Women and the Survival of Community* (2012); Her 2014 book *My Grandfather's Knocking Sticks: Ojibwe Family Life and Labor on the Reservation* won the American Indian Book Award. She is the author of a best-selling bi-lingual book for children, *Bowwow Powwow* (2018). She was a member of the Board of Trustees of the National Museum of the American Indian-Smithsonian (2013-18) and was President of the Native American & Indigenous Studies Association (2017-18). She was consultant to a major exhibit, *Away from Home: American Indian Boarding School Stories* at the Heard Museum. Child was born on the Red Lake Ojibwe Reservation in northern Minnesota and was part of a committee developing a new constitution for the 15,000- member nation.

### **Georgina Feldberg Memorial Student Award**

Dr. Feldberg was a dedicated teacher and scholar of social history of medicine, public health, and the gendered politics of disease, who firmly believed that history has an important role to play in shaping public policy. The history of health and medicine community lost an important voice when Dr. Feldberg died far too young in 2010.

The Feldberg Memorial Award is granted annually to the best unpublished essay based on original research on any topic within the history of health and medicine. Essays are not restricted by geography or time period. Students in related disciplines are eligible to apply, but all essays must include a clear historical argument and engage with the relevant historiography.

The winner will receive \$500 and a year's membership with the CSHM-SCHM, which includes a subscription to the *CBMH/BCHM*. Finalists may be encouraged to have their submissions considered for publication in the *CBMH/BCHM*, subject to our peer review process.

### **Le prix Georgina Feldberg**

Enseignante dévouée, Gina Feldberg a axé ses recherches sur l'histoire sociale de la médecine, de la santé publique et du genre. Elle croyait fermement que la connaissance de l'histoire doit jouer un rôle dans l'élaboration des politiques publiques. Les historien.ne.s de la santé et de la médecine ont perdu une voix importante lorsque G. Feldberg s'est éteinte, bien trop jeune, en 2010.

Le prix est remis chaque année à la meilleure dissertation (non publiée) faisant état d'une recherche originale en histoire de la santé et de la médecine, quel que soit l'espace-temps traité. Les étudiant.e.s de disciplines connexes à l'histoire sont éligibles, du moment que leur dissertation contienne une démonstration historique évidente et s'inscrive dans l'historiographie.

La gagnante ou le gagnant recevra 500 dollars, un an d'adhésion à la CSHM-SCHM et une année d'abonnement au *Canadian Bulletin of Medical History / Bulletin canadien d'histoire de la médecine (CBMH/BCHM)*. Les finalistes seront éventuellement incité.e.s à publier leur texte dans le *CBMH/BCHM*, après évaluation anonyme par les pairs.

### **Segall Prize**

Harold Nathan Segall (1897-1990) was a distinguished cardiologist and one of the founders of the Canadian Heart Association. He took a strong interest in medical history and was the author of *Pioneers of Cardiology in Canada, 1820-1970: The Genesis of Canadian Cardiology*. The Segall award was established in his honour, not long after his death, to promote the work of students at the Canadian Society for the History of Medicine.

### **Le prix Segall**

Harold Nathan Segall (1897-1990) était un éminent cardiologue et l'un des fondateurs de la Société canadienne de cardiologie. Il se passionnait pour l'histoire de la médecine et a écrit *Pioneers of Cardiology in Canada, 1820-1970 : The Genesis of Canadian Cardiology*. Le prix Segall a été créé en son honneur, peu de temps après sa mort, pour promouvoir le travail d'étudiant.e.s de la Société canadienne d'histoire de la médecine.
